Phonics Skill: Base Words and Suffixes
On Wednesday we will have a comprehension quiz over the story we read as homework on Monday night. On Friday we have a weekly assessment (this one will be taken on paper) over the sequencing and other skills covered this week, and we will have a multiple -choice vocabulary quiz. All of these will be taken on the computer.

## Spelling (LA Standard 3.W.6.2)

The Spelling List 3 is over base word and endings. Students will focus how suffixes can change the meaning of a word. The list was distributed Friday, the 24th. There will be a trial test on Wednesday and a final test on Friday. If a student get $100 \%$ on the trial test, he/she is excused from taking the final test. Most students have words 1-20 on their list. A few students have five additional words. The spelling list is available on the Parent Information page under Spelling
